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#### Air Canada unveils routes for converted freighters

Air Canada and Air Canada Cargo have announced routes for the Boeing 767-300ER freighters scheduled to enter service this fall. Air Canada is converting several of its Boeing 767 aircraft into dedicated freighters. When the first two converted 767 freighters enters service in October, they will fly primarily out of Toronto Pearson International Airport, and will operate on routes linking Toronto to Miami; Quito, Ecuador; Lima, Peru; Mexico City and Guadalajara, the first time Air Canada Cargo will serve this destination. As more freighters enter service in 2022, the carrier plans to add flights to Halifax, St. John's, Madrid and Frankfurt.

# U.S. Airlines Narrow Net Loss in 1st Quarter 2021 from 4th Quarter 2020

U.S. scheduled passenger airlines reported a first-quarter 2021 after-tax net loss of \$4.2 billion and a pre-tax operating loss of \$12.7 billion. While these first-quarter losses are the fifth consecutive quarterly losses, the extent of the losses is narrowing. The airlines reduced their losses in the first quarter from the fourth quarter of 2020. The first-quarter after-tax net loss of \$4.2 billion was reduced from the fourth-quarter loss of \$7.0 billion. The first-quarter pre-tax operating loss of \$12.7 billion was increased from the fourth-quarter loss of \$9.7 billion. U.S. airline financial reports are filed quarterly with the Bureau of Transportation Statistics (BTS). Additional first-quarter 2021 financial results can be found on its website.

#### Concorde to New York: Article #3 by Jennifer Coutts Clay, CMILT

As we continue to explore the return of commercial supersonic flight, let's review the challenges of Concorde operations.

In principle, reducing travel time between major cities is a boon to passengers, but it is the supersonic boom heard by those who live on the ground that has caused the greatest debate. Even now, concerns remain about noise pollution related to supersonic operations and while the FAA has reopened studies it has not, for now, approved overflight of the continental U.S. In 1970, when it was introduced into commercial service, Europe had welcomed with boundless enthusiasm the giant Boeing B747, but in the US there was no such reciprocal welcome when Concorde commenced operations in 1976. As detailed in the article CONCORDE TO NEW YORK, written by Jennifer Coutts Clay, author of JETLINER CABINS: Evolution and Innovation, for Aircraft Interiors International Magazine in 2017, restrictions on service and delays in approving key routes impacted the economics of Concorde and seriously impeded recovery on investment for airlines.

In some ways, the political and operational challenges of Concorde endure. When supersonic service returns to the skies, will manufacturers and airlines succeed in cutting out the noise and streamlining the politics of speed? To read "Concorde to New York", please <u>click here</u>.
